Brief History

From its beginning, The Apostolic Assembly has had the need to train its ministers and leaders. During the first convention in 1925, which has held in San Bernadino, California, it was immediately noticeable to our founders that ample time needed to be giving to the study of different issues. This practice was maintained for many conventions, as these respective acts demonstrate. President Antonio C. Nava and Benjamin Cantu were burdened to provide some type of formal education to their pastors and ministers. Pastors Leonardo Sepulveda, Ernesto Cantu, and others-initiated bible college projects, but these were economically limited.

In 1966, under the direction of pastor Eleazar Rodriguez, the National Apostolic Bible College was founded in Hayward, California. There he works with much success for many years. Many of his graduates served faithfully as pastors. Others continue to serve in different functions as teachers, leaders, or bishops. In 1978, the NABC was moved to San Jose, California. Where its rector was bishop Daniel Jauhall. The National Apostolic Bible College was then moved to facilities of the Apostolic Assembly in Ontario, California. There, its rector was bishop Richard Almaraz, the Secretary of Christian Education at the time.

Bishop Samuel Valverde, the Secretary of Christian Education from 1990 to 1998, directed the NABC during his service, and implemented an experimental program called "Apostolic Institute of Ministries. A specific contribution of this period was the realization of different intensive courses for pastors of all districts. By the end of 1980s, different districts began to realize educational programs for their pastors to address the need to better equip ministers and leaders.

From 1998 to 2006, bishop Luciano Montes, who served these years as Secretary of Christian Education, prompted the formation of a Bible College in every district, under the authority of the NABC, with the aid of bishop Marcos Zacarias. This was another very important step to take biblical preparation to the whole nation. In the beginning of 2007, Secretary of Christian Education, bishop Ismael Martin del Campo traced out the following goals:

- **A)** To recognize the international outreach of the college, the name was changed from National Apostolic Bible College to "INTERNATIONAL APOSTOLIC BIBLE COLLEGE" (IABC).
- **B)** The goal was established to have 40 manuals for the complete Bachelor's in Theology program to be written by apostolic teachers and pastors.
- **C)** Steps were taken so that the IABC graduates could continue in post-graduate studies at fully accredited institutes. This is now a present reality through the accord signed with some of these seminaries.



General Rules

- 1. All students must fill out an application of admission and a letter of recommendation signed by their respective pastor. By signing this application, students are committing to obey all rules and regulations of the IABC WTXD, including the submission to the 19 doctrinal points found in the constitution of the Apostolic Assembly.
- 2. To attend, we recommend that all students to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.
- 3. All students must dress according to the apostolic doctrine and principles: Casual Elegant No Shorts on Men No pants or short skirts on Women No make-up No jewelry Ladies must wear veils No bad Behavior on Class
- 4. The Instructor is the maximum authority during class time.
- 5. All students must be up to date with the payments of their classes. If any student is more than 2 months behind on their payments, they will be suspended until they cover the pending balance.
- 6. Students must pay all outstanding fees before graduating and receiving their diploma.
- 7. The Cost for the Graduation Diploma and Stole is \$140.00 dlls. The cost for the the Cap, Gown, and Tassel is \$60.00 dlls. (subject to change)
- 8. Attendance is mandatory for each class session of every course offered. Attendance is required for all students. Anyone taking a class online must be visible during class. Students can miss only two sessions (each night is a session) of any given course. Absences must be of an emergency nature to be approved by the instructor. Any student missing more than two sessions per course must consult with the director to regain the course.



COURSES CREDITS

For a course to be accredited, students require the following:

- 1. Be up to date with the payments of his registration.
- 2. Be present in all 4 lessons of the accredited course. (Only 2 absences per course will be justified and only due to emergency.)
- 3. Turn in every Homework of the accredited course.
- 4. Be up to date with the payment of classes of the accredited course.
- 5. Be up to date with the payment of the book of the accredited course.
- 6. If a student cannot attend one or more courses of any given period, and he wants to recover that course, he will need proof that justifies why he stopped attending that course.
- 7. Only 3 missed courses can be recovered per period. If a student missed more than 3 courses of any given period, he would not qualify for graduation until he takes the missed courses on a regular period.
- 8. If a student is more than 3 consecutive months behind on the payments of his classes, books, and HomeWorks, he will be withdrawn from the program in which he was registered.
- 9. If for any reason, a student is unable to pay for his classes, but does not want to be removed from the program, he will need to speak to the administration of the Bible College to give a justified reason and to make payment arrangements for his classes.
